

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#### Happy New Year



None of us quite know what to expect when a new year dawns. Two years ago, as we went into 2020, we would never have imagined how disrupted and changed our lives would be because of the coronavirus pandemic. Perhaps that's a good thing – we were able to celebrate the turning of the year with joy and looking forward, rather than with a fear of what was to hit us.

Some of you know that back in October, I went to the island of Iona with a group from the diocese, led by the

Bishop of Sherborne. The Christian community on Iona began when Columba, in a small boat, crossed the sea from Ireland as a missionary. The story goes that Iona was the first place he stopped at where he could no longer see his homeland.

The faith in Northern England was mainly inherited from their Celtic neighbours; while further south, it was missionaries from the Roman Church who brought Christianity to this country. Over time, the Latinised version dominated and the Celtic traditions all but died out.

Fortunately in the past 30 years or so, people have begun to rediscover them. One of the great joys of the Celtic tradition is the explicit focus on God in daily life. There are prayers for home and hearth, for farmers and fishers, for getting up and going to bed, for friends and strangers. In all these prayers is a sense that God is part of the every day, encircling everyone. There are prayers for protection, for help, and wonderful blessings. The popular hymn Be Thou my Vision is based on a Celtic prayer.

As the new year dawn and none of us know what it will hold, I offer three prayers from the Celtic tradition. The first reminds us that, even when we are weak, God's strength is with us:

I arise today through a mighty strength: God's power to guide me, God's might to uphold me, God's eyes to watch over me; God's ear to hear me, God's word to give me speech, God's hand to guard me, God's way to lie before me, God's shield to shelter me, God's host to secure me.



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
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The second is an acknowledgement that God has many dimensions:

You are the peace of all things calm. You are the place to hide from harm. You are the light that shines in dark. You are the heart's eternal spark. You are the door that's open wide. You are the guest who waits inside. You are the stranger at the door. You are the scalling of the poor. You are my Lord and with me still. You are my love, keep me from ill. You are the light, the truth, the way. You are my Saviour this very day.

Finally, my wish and prayer for you for the coming year:

May your year be filled with blessings like the sun that lights the sky, and may you always have the courage to spread your wings and fly!


#### **BENEFICE PRAYER GROUP**

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#### A Northern Pilgrimage – Iona, Inner Hebrides

I've always had an affinity for St Columba as his saint's day is my birthday. This trip to Iona, where he built the Christian community, had been a long time in coming. I'd originally booked to go in 1995, but sadly ill-health prevented my going, so when I read that the Bishop of Sherborne was leading a trip for people in Salisbury diocese, I jumped at the chance. This time the trip was only postponed by a year: from 2020 to 2021.

Two members of the Puddletown church congregation and I set off on our long journey on Tuesday 19<sup>th</sup> October. We reached Glasgow by car, train, plane and taxi, where we joined the rest of the group for an overnight stop at a hotel whose name I shall not mention. The rooms were generally fine, but . . . I and others in the group spent a fair amount of time reading the colourful, glossy menu laid out for us in the bedrooms, deciding what we would eat for our evening meal and whether to choose a supper-breakfast deal or not. The reality was far from the anticipation. The actual dining-room menu was nothing like it. Little choice, running out of what was on the menu, miniscule portions for some, dreadful service and an inability to calculate the bill correctly - just paying for our food took more than half an hour. Needless to say, on the return journey most of us ate out.

The journey to Iona the next day, mainly by coach and boat, provided some stunning views: Loch Lomond in particular had me transfixed. We drove from Glasgow to Oban, where we joined the ferry to Mull. Standing on deck, sea all around, I began to shake off the busy-ness and mind-whirling that is part of my daily life and find peace. Across Mull by coach before a much smaller boat took us to Iona itself.

We trudged up the hill to our hotel, the hill that the following day seemed only like a gentle rise, but which at the end of a day's travelling appeared steeper than it really was. The Columba hotel, where we would spend the next five nights, was warm and welcoming.

I fell in love with the island. Over the next few days, we listened to talks from the Bishop about the Celtic saints and joined the Iona community for services in the Abbey, an imposing building. Columba arrived in the year 563 and built a monastery where he and his band of brothers lived. In spite of many Viking raids, their buildings stood until the end of the 12<sup>th</sup>-century. The current abbey dates back to the founding of a Benedictine community in around 1200. Monasticism remained a dominant feature of Iona life until the Reformation, when everything ended.

There were organised group trips around the island and to Mull, but I chose to do my own thing. One day I took a trip to Staffa, the home of Fingal's cave, which has so memorably influenced the composer Felix Mendelssohn, the poets Wordsworth, Keats and Tennyson, and the artist Turner. Even Queen Victoria made the trip. The cave is amazing. Similar to the Giant's Causeway in



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Ireland, which is perhaps better known, it is made from hexagonal basalt columns. I didn't sing while there – there were several in the cave at the time – but the acoustics are incredible.

On another day, I visited the abbey as a tourist not a worshipper. It is a stark and cold building but the warmth inside has been created by those who now live and work there. In 1938 George MacLeod, a church minister from a desperately poor dockland parish in Govan, Glasgow, took unemployed skilled craftsmen and young trainee clergy to Iona to rebuild both the monastic quarters of the mediaeval abbey and create common life by working and living together, sharing skills and effort as well as joys and achievement. His original vision has adapted as time has moved on, but a community still lives, works and worships there with social justice at its heart.

Alongside the church buildings is the Abbey museum, full of artefacts and information. Historic Scotland looks after it, and it has one of the best Scottish collections of earliest crosses and graves.

On another day, Emma from Puddletown and I wandered down to St Columba's Bay, where he is believed to have landed when he first arrived in Iona. Here we found an array of beautiful pebbles of all different shades and hues.

For all the history of the place, what really spoke to me above all else was the beauty and peace of the island. I spent hours on the empty sandy beaches on the island's north coast, watching the waves roll in and out, praying, marvelling at the beauty of creation and just being. I found deep inner and outer peace. Most days when I visited, I was alone on the expanses of sand.

And the rainbows. Never have I seen so many in such a small amount of time. A symbol of hope from earliest times, it was as if they were everywhere following us around and reminding me of the phenomenal world in which we live, where beauty is all around, in the sky, sea and on land.

I came home determined to find more peace and space in my life and wanting to build a cloister in which to house a Hieland coo! The first of those aims is still a work in progress. I can't imagine the second ever happening, but life is the poorer without dreams. And I did bring back two cuddly toy versions of the cow, now named Columba and Iona.

#### New ringing teacher looking for a learner!

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#### A Month on the Farm

As we get nearer to Christmas we have to plan further ahead to purchase minerals, milk powder, fuel and any other things we might need as lots of the firms will be closing down or working shorter hours over the festive season. Though at the time of writing Covid is rearing it's ugly head again, so none of us know what is around the corner!

We are changing the ration of the cattle feed, taking out the oil seed rape meal and replacing it with a protein pea which has been grown by a local farming friend down the dual carriageway near Bere Regis, these peas had not made the grade for tinned peas, (mushy peas) as the sun had bleached the pea and they were not green enough in colour. This will be mixed with our home grown barley which we roll here on the farm, this is literally rolled between two large rollers to flatten it and then mixed with minerals and the peas, to give a good nutritious balanced feed. With the housed cattle having some hay, straw or silage which is also keeping the feed bill as low as we can possibly do, whilst not compromising the cattle growth rates.



Some cattle are still outside grazing the grass and others are grazing their way through the fields of turnips; some of these cattle are eating some of our home mix and others are on the round bales of silage that were made over the summer months.

The earlier sown autumn crops of winter barley and wheat have grown on well with the kind weather we have had of late. Some fields have received a pass with the sprayer applying a mix of weed killer and an aphicide. The large liquid fertilizer tanks are filled in preparation for the spring applications and taking advantage of the lower winter fill prices.

All the ewes are grazing the downland with the aim to pull the grass right down, so there is plenty of light and little competition for the wild flowers and rarer grass species to flourish in the warm days of spring.

The new barn has now been partly filled with straw and some machinery although the guttering and boarding is a job still to be done.

thinking about the plight of refugees in their Theology and Ethics lessons. Lots of very thought-provoking work was produced, including poetry and artworks.



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

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## Dorset Trading Standards News – Wood Fuel

Harmful levels of air pollution can damage people's health and reduce their quality of life. We can all be affected by this, but some, especially children, older people, and those with respiratory problems, can be affected most.



While only 8% of homes use log burners, they are now the biggest cause of a particular type of particulate matter smaller than 2.5 microns across. These are tiny, generally the human eye can see debris and dust that are only approximately 25 microns in size. It's these tiny particles that can enter the blood-stream which can potentially cause serious health issues for those most susceptible to them. As the popularity of log burners has grown the amount of this type of particulate has increased, it's more than doubled since 2003.

Therefore, in the first changes to what consumers can burn in their home for 70 years the UK government has introduced the Air Quality Regulations 2020. This new law restricts the sale of wet wood which when burnt produces more tiny particles than seasoned or dry wood. Banning the sale of wet wood should help improve air quality for all.

Wood fuel can now only be sold in volumes of less than 2 cubic metres if it is certified as 'Ready to Burn'. This confirms it has a moisture content of 20% or less. It applies to both firewood and wood briquettes sold in single retail bags or supplied as a bulk delivery in loose volumes of less than 2 cubic metres. Traders are also required to store the wood in such a way that it is not sold to customers damaged or wet.

## **Dorchester Poverty Action**

Dorchester Poverty Action (DPA) has been working locally throughout the pandemic providing grants of up to £250 to those living in DT1 and DT2, who are at a point of financial crisis. A small amount of money can make the difference between just managing and beginning a downward spiral of debt.

Over the last 2 years people have been made redundant, some people have not been eligible for furlough but have no on-going work, the prevalence of domestic abuse increased and children have not been at school, some with no access to online learning. DPA has been there throughout, working with local professionals, providing grants for furniture to those moving away from an abusive relationship, computers for a school in DT2, nursery equipment for a new baby, a car repair for a rural worker to get to their job and when the schools returned, grants for school uniform, especially shoes.

Grants have also been provided to help cover fuel costs, as people were at home all day during lockdown. DPA's fuel grants will become even more needed as the cost of fuel rises this winter. Many of us have just received our letter stating that we will be receiving the DHSS annual winter fuel payment of £200. Do you need that £200? This amount of money could make a real difference to a family in DT1 or DT2, who has to decide whether to feed the children or heat the home.



### The 2022 Salisbury Cathedral Flower Festival

Planning for the 2022 flower festival at Salisbury Cathedral is well underway. "Celebration" A Festival of Flowers takes place from Tuesday 10<sup>th</sup> to Sunday 15<sup>th</sup> May and will involve hundreds of arrangers.

It is designed by Michael Bowyer, Pam Lewis and Angela Turner, all Chelsea gold medallists.

Michael, director of Salisbury Cathedral Flowers and president of the National Association of Flower Arrangement Societies (NAFAS), said everyone was saddened when the festival planned for 2020 could not go ahead due to the pandemic.

But, he said, next year's festival will include elements of the cancelled festival as well as themes celebrating the Queen's platinum jubilee, key workers, the power of nature, the cathedral's treasures and the Church's year.

"As well as members of Salisbury Cathedral Flowers, every flower club and every church from the Diocese of Salisbury has been invited to take part," said Michael.

He added that the festival would be environmentally friendly, as arrangers would be using compostable substitutes for floral foam, and a section of the displays would focus on bees and other pollinators.

#### News from the Dorchester office of Central Dorset Citizens Advice

#### **Buy now, Pain later?**

With the post-Christmas sales and other advertising offers many of us will be tempted to buy items that we cannot afford to pay for immediately? Are you tempted by the offer of a scheme that would allow you to delay or split the payment? You may have seen companies such as Klarna, Clearpay, LayBuy, Open Pay or Pay Pal offering payment schemes they say will make buying more manageable. These products are becoming very popular - it's estimated that 14 million people in the UK have used one of them in the last year.

Although this method of payment can be helpful for some customers it is a credit product that is inherently risky. Citizens Advice has recently published a report called 'Buy Now, Pain Later', outlining some of the problems customers have faced by using these products. They are marketed as a smooth and easy payment method. However it's all too easy to be drawn into one of the schemes without fully realising the full implications. In fact many people become involved by accident because it is the default payment method on some retailers' websites or there is an offer attached to using the product that encourages customers to sign up. There is often a lack of information at the checkout to help people understand that what they are agreeing to is a credit product and what the consequences will be if they are not able to make repayments.

If you are intending to take advantage of one of these products it is very important that you read the small print carefully so that you understand exactly what is involved and what you are signing up to.
